

Fiscal Code (Codice Fiscale)

A unique alphanumeric code used to identify individuals in Italy.

- Visa (non-EU students) and a photocopy of it
- Form filled in

IMMIGRATION PROCEDURE - Non-EU citizens

- Entry visa required for long-term stays apply via the UNIVERSITALY portal (pre-enrolment).
- Apply for a Residence Permit or submit a Declaration of Presence within 8 working days of arrival.
- Exception: Non-EU students residing in a Schengen country for study and joining an exchange programme may enter without a Visa if they hold a valid residence permit and meet all legal requirements.

If you enter Italy with a Study Visa





IF YOU ENTER ITALY WITH A STUDY VISA RESIDENCE PERMIT APPLICATION PROCESS

SUBMIT APPLICATION

Within 8 working days (excluding weekends), submit your residence permit application. Assistance: Get help at the PoliTO Immigration Desk. Reserve your appointment on your PoliTO student page.

COLLECT DOCUMENTATION

Gather all necessary documents before your appointment.

SEND APPLICATION

Submit at any «Sportello Amico» of any Post Office.

•Fees: Pay €70.46 (postal slip) + €30.00 (envelope).

•Postal Receipt: This serves as your temporary residence permit.

FINGERPRINTS APPOINTMENT

Attend your fingerprints appointment at the Immigration Office of Questura.

COLLECT RESIDENCE PERMIT CARD

Wait for the appointment to collect your residence permit card at the Immigration Office.





If you enter Italy with a Schengen residence permit





IF YOU ENTER ITALY WITH A SCHENGEN **RESIDENCE PERMIT**

You may be allowed to enter Italy without an Italian visa for a stay longer than 90 days if ALL the following conditions are met:



1. Student Status

- You are **enrolled in a university** degree program in another **Schengen country**
- You are an incoming Erasmus+ or Exchange student (Double Degree / Bilateral Agreement)
- You have official documentation confirming your participation in the exchange programme



2. Visa and Residence **Permit**

You hold a visa and a valid residence permit for study reasons:

- Issued by the **Schengen** country where you are enrolled
- ✓ Covering the entire duration or at least part of your stay in Italy



3. Duration of Stay

Your stay in Italy does not exceed 360 days



If your stay in Italy exceeds 360 days, a visa is required.



Scenario 1 - Valid Schengen Residence Permit

If you have a valid residence permit¹:

- for study purposes
- issued by a Schengen country
- that covers your entire stay in Italy
- i 1 In some EU countries, the residence permit is substituted by a registration at the Police, a declaration by a local authority or the EU visa itself.

- To Enter Italy
- X No need to apply for a study visa
- ✓ Valid for stays up to 360 days



- Apply for a Declaration of Presence
- At the Immigration Office of Questura in Torino
- Tild Within 8 working days of arrival



Scenario 2 - Valid Schengen Residence Permit

If you have a valid residence permit¹:

- for study purposes
- issued by a Schengen country
- expiring after entry or not covering your full stay in Italy
- i 1 In some EU countries, the residence permit is substituted by a registration at the Police, a declaration by a local authority or the EU visa itself.





- X No need to apply for a study visa
- ✓ Valid for stays up to 360 days

- Apply for the **Italian residence permit**
- Before your current permit expires

△ Travel Restriction Reminder

- If your Schengen residence permit has expired and you only have the receipt for your Italian permit application → X You cannot travel outside Italy



RESIDENCE PERMIT – ADDITIONAL INFO



8 days from your arrival: you must apply for the residence permit



From 2 to 7 months to attend the fingerprints appointment



50 days approximately after the appointment to receive the permit card (you will receive a sms from Questura when it will be ready)



60 days before your permit expires you can start the RENEWAL PROCEDURE (send an e-mail to Immigration Desk)



RESIDENCE PERMIT – ADDITIONAL INFO



VERIFY YOUR APPLICATION ONLINE

You can check your application <u>here</u> by entering the USERNAME ID and PASSWORD found on your postal receipt.



TRAVEL WITH THE RECEIPT OF THE FIRST PERMIT

Holding a valid D type Visa permits you to stay in Italy and travel throughout the **Schengen Area** (passport + Visa + postal receipt) for a **maximum of 90 days**. Ensure that your **Visa is multi-entry** for travel purposes.

(once your Visa expires, you **CANNOT** use only the receipt to travel outside of Italy)



TRAVEL WITH A VALID ELECTRONIC CARD OF THE RESIDENCE PERMIT

With a valid residence permit released from a Schengen country **you can travel** in the Schengen area without asking for a Visa for a maximum of 90 days;

(for non-Schengen countries → you must check if they ask for a visa to enter **before** your travel)



HEALTH INSURANCE – NON EU CITIZENS

1. Private Insurance

- Issued in your name (Latin characters), in Italian or EN/FR/ES
- Valid in Italy/Schengen Area
- Coverage: €30,000 minimum, 6–12 months duration
- Must be endorsed by Italian Embassy if non-Italian

2. Bilateral Agreements

- Proof of health coverage under treaties with Italy
- Document issued by Italian Embassy/Consulate



3. Italian National Health Service (SSN)

- Cost: €700/year (Jan-Dec, non-refundable)
- Includes: GP, hospitalization, prescriptions, vaccines, specialist care


